### 1. Approval of the Minutes:

January 2008 Minutes were approved as amended (McBrearty/Garcia)

2. Report Items: none

#### 3. Discussion Items/ Action Items:

**CATS Conference 2008:** Hendricks distributed letters of request for sponsorship to the CATS conference. Allisun O'Connell, Joan Van Duzer, and Mason Long. A motion was made to approve all request and the motion carried (Shellhase/Pearson). Hendricks noted that sponsored participants must give a presentation regarding the conference upon their return.

**Procedure – Campus Manager:** Callahan noted that some members of the campus community were questioning the frequency of re-registering their wireless (monthly). Discussion ensued regarding options. McKenzie made a motion to amend the existing ITC procedure to change the monthly registration expiration interval from monthly to the beginning of summer break, fall break, winter break, and spring break. The motion carried (McKenzie/Shellhase).

Host Configurations for Systems using Active Directory: McBrearty distributed a reminder to IT support staff regarding systems using centralized authentication. These systems must also use some form of authorization (central or local) to prevent unauthorized access. A brief discussion ensued. McBrearty noted that questions should be directed to <a href="mailto:systems-unauthorized-sys

**Disposal of Hard Drives and Media:** McBrearty revisited the discussion on disposal of hard disks and media. He reported that there is already a system-wide contract in place with a vendor for recycling. T.C. Comet is our campus contact with the vendor. McBrearty and Comet will be working out the procedures for the disposal of items with sensitive data. The vendor would be required to provide us with signed notification that the items were removed and destroyed. McBrearty noted that he would inform the Council when the procedures were in place. Marshall noted that TC Comet will recycle any item if it does not have an HSU ID number. Items with HSU ID numbers need to be tracked through another process.

Windows Vista: Marshall questioned the status of implementation of Vista on campus. Kircher noted that XP will continue security patches until 2014 so there is not urgency. Discussion ensued regarding the benefits and disadvantages of a campus-wide implementation of Vista. Gordon stated that it would not benefit the campus in any way and would only cause problems and would be a mistake to implement it on this campus. Wielgus noted that Vista is already on the campus via new machines that come with Vista, the Bookstore sells Vista (only), and there are some HP5750 machines that "hiccup" ADA applications unless they are running Vista. The topic was tabled and it was agreed to forward the issue on to the Desktop Support Working Group. Steve Darnall is the Chair of DSWG and any feedback regarding the topic should be sent to him. The group will need to evaluate soon – if there is a move to Vista the faculty will need to be notified in a timely manner.

McKenzie asked for assistance with dynamically created listserves. Callahan will discuss the issues with McKenzie. Pearson noted that it should be helpful to have a translation table of username and actual name when updated manually created listserves. A brief discussion ensued.

## **Host Configurations for Systems using Active Directory**

Campus IT support staff are reminded that systems using centralized authentication must also use some form of authorization (central or local) to prevent unauthorized access, specifically for platforms where Windows Group Policies are not applicable or have not been enabled.

Recently a Linux host that used winbind to obtain authentication and authorization information from Active Directory did not have additional settings to control unauthorized access.

Consequently the HSU Kiosk account ("hsu") was able to be used to access a local account on the Linux client to perform BitTorrent downloads in violation of the HSU Acceptable Use Policy.

The Kiosk account exists in Active Directory to allow users of Windows machines in computer labs to have access to the WebReg system. Windows Group Policies enforce the limited scope of the Kiosk account; however non-Windows systems that authenticate against Active Directory require additional steps to restrict the access provided to that account.

In general, access controls for Linux systems using winbind to connect to Active Directory must be enforced at the console and service level.

Console access must be protected through PAM module configurations that restrict local access based on local or AD group membership. Other services that allow remote access to Linux systems authenticating via winbind must be configured to restrict access based on local or AD group membership either through PAM or through service configurations.

PAM can be used to restrict logins to select groups and or locations as follows:

To restrict console logins edit the files

/etc/pam.d/login and /etc/pam.d/gdm

add this line to the account section:

account required pam\_access.so

To restrict logins to members of wheel and HSU students, staff, and faculty, edit

/etc/security/access.conf

add the line

:

ALL EXCEPT wheel student staff faculty:LOCAL

For systems allowing sshd or samba, add the line listed above to the appropriate /etc/pam.d/<file>

Some Mac OS systems that use AD for authentication will require additional configurations, such as Login Hook modification, to restrict local access based on local or AD group membership. This solution applies primarily to OS versions prior to OS X 10.5.

Lastly, Windows administrators must ensure that appropriate group policy settings are enabled for all Windows systems bound to Active Directory.
